

year, summer brought us a number of dried up or just damp areas where we usually see standing water. Although the refuge has water pumps to move water around between different areas, it is sometimes better to just let nature dictate what should happen. Wetlands, in particular, can benefit from a dry cycle. It allows toxins to oxidize, instead of buildup in the mud, and can take care of some less desirable plants while letting beneficial wetland plants regrow and thrive. As an example, Long Lake is very dry now. Long Lake is the one with all the dead tree trunks in it which you see on the left of the road section that ends at the hunter's gate. Under the right conditions, seeds that lay dormant in the mud will sprout and produce vegetation we don't see each year. This year, Long Lake is filled with lush green Beggar's-Tick. This plant is from the aster family and blooms in late summer, providing opportunity for pollinators and, eventually, seeds which will fall into the wetlands to wait for dabbling ducks to dine on them when the water returns. The seeds are double barbed and easily stick to pant legs or socks if you were to wander through a patch; presumable beggars did this some time ago-hence the name Beggar's-Tick. Watch for the flowers to appear soon. It should be a beautiful sight as we wait for the return of fall/winter rains to fill a renewed Long Lake again.

Friends of Ridgefield NWR & Ridgefield Public Schools Foundation Helps Fund Mobile Science Equipment

The Ridgefield Public Schools Foundation, with support from the Ridgefield Booster Club and Friends of the Ridgefield National Wildlife



Refuge, funded a Science Technology grant to support the Ridgefield High School science program during the 2015-2016 school year. In total the \$15,100 grant funded 14 laptop computers, 24 Vernier sensors and a laptop storage cart.

RHS science teacher, Kara Breuer, put the new equipment to use in the field last spring. Through a partnership with the Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge, students from RHS science classes were able to collect and investigate soil and water samples from the Refuge's Duck Lake and Boot Lake to determine if the Wapato potatoes that grow nearby were safe to eat.

Using equipment purchased with the Foundation grant and a

visit to a chemistry lab at the University of Portland, the students determined that the soil and water located around the two lakes were all within typical limits for health risk factors and concluded the area was safe for the harvest of the Wapato potato. Breuer stated that the new equipment and the partnership with the University of Portland "made this a unique and hugely successful learning experience." She is already making plans to use the equipment for a follow-up experiment next year.

Foundation Board Member Audri Bomar commented on the collaboration that made the grant and the experiment possible.

"The Foundation was one of many partners that made this possible. When we all work together we can help dedicated teachers like Ms. Breuer create meaningful learning experiences right in our back yard."



Species Spotlight

Wood Duck Aix sponsa



One of the most spectacular sights out on the water in the Refuge has to be the gloriously colorful Wood Duck. Both male and female sport helmet-like crests and long, broad tails. The males have distinctive iridescent feathers in green and reddish-brown, with buff-colored sides and sharp white outlines that make these rich colors really pop. Females have white around their eyes, white speckled breasts and brownish-grey bodies. In flight, Wood Ducks are distinctive for their erect thin necks, long bodies, short wings, and thick tails and they can reach speeds of up to 30 miles per hour.

Wood Ducks are aptly named, as they prefer to nest in trees in wooded areas near wetlands, ponds and streams, although some nests are found more than a mile from the

water. You will often see Wood Duck nesting boxes placed along lakes or rivers where natural choices are more limited. Their shorter wing span allows them to skillfully navigate through the woods. Unlike most ducks, they perch comfortably in trees thanks to strong claws on their feet. Their claws are not suited to excavating, however, so pairs will search out existing cavities in trees with soft or rotting cores. The female makes the final choice for the nest and then lines the cavity with her own down feathers. They will have one or two broods a season, with between 6 and 16 eggs each. The eggs hatch about after about a month and the young, fully covered in down, are able to immediately walk to the nest opening and jump down to the ground to join their parents on the water. The hatchlings are resilient enough to make leaps of as much as 50 feet!

Wood Ducks eat mostly plant material such as duckweed, water lilies, acorns, soybeans, wild cherries, and blackberries. They also eat various insects, caterpillars and snails. They are dabblers and may also dive in search of food.

Did you know: Wood Duck females are also known to lay eggs in another female's nest and leave them to her care. As a result, nests with as many as 29 eggs are not unheard of.

Habitat Restoration Updates & Events

Habitat activities on the Refuge continued during August with volunteers busy searching and removing invasive species such as purple loosestrife, false indigo bush, knotweeds, ragwort tansy, toadflax, and bulrush. The end of August also means the ricefield bulrush season is coming to a close. The conditions have been favorable for bulrush this summer, so plants have been large and healthy, with some plants growing almost 4 feet tall! In August, volunteers and employees pulled about 2600 plants from four wetlands on the River 'S' Unit, bringing our total to 23,630 plants for the summer. We've had great August volunteer turnout at our work parties with 430 volunteer hours... 15 returning volunteers, and 64 brand new volunteers. Thank you! The wildlife at the Refuge are grateful for their home improvements! September 3rd will be our last bulrush searching day, so that's your last chance to join us this summer. However, bulrush will be back next summer, just waiting to be found and pulled.

As we close out the summer months we are making plans to collect seeds and cuttings from our more desirable plants
