

Species Spotlight

Friends of Ridgefield NWR Bird of the Year Western Tanager Piranga ludoviciana



Our Bird of the Year is the colorful Western Tanager, an evergreen canopy loving bird, we see it only rarely on the refuge in the Spring, Summer and Fall. These birds breed in generally more open woods all over the West as far north as Alaska. Western Tanagers frequent a wide variety of fairly open coniferous surroundings during migration, but will also visit manmade habitats such as orchards, parks, and suburban gardens. In



the early fall, they migrate south to Mexico and Central America.

About three-fourths the size of an American Robin, these songbirds are stocky, with short thick-based bills and medium-length tails. The sexes differ greatly in breeding plumage. Males of the species are a stunning bright yellow with black wings and a red-orange head resembling a flame. The wings have two bold wingbars, with the upper one yellow and the lower white, their backs and tails black. Females are duller, with olivegreen upperparts, contrasting with a yellowish rump and variable belly color from bright yellow to gray. In the Fall, the male loses much of his bright color, looking more like the female but with a darker gray back. Most birds with red plumage gain their coloring from plant pigments called carotenoids, but the Western Tanager owes its red feathers to a rare pigment called rhodoxanthin. Since they are unable to make this pigment in their own bodies, it is believed they acquire it through the insects they eat.

Western Tanagers nest in conifers. though they also nest in oaks and other broad-leaf trees. They can be seen at up to 10,000 feet elevations in western North American spruce-fir treelines. Male Western Tanagers perform courtship rituals where they purposely fall past the female, flashing their yellow and black plumage in order to catch her eye. The female builds a twig nest, and then incubates the 3 to 5 eggs for about 13 days. It takes another 11 to 15 days for them to fledge from the nest.

Often hard to observe, this bird works its way in a slow methodical fashion through the trees, eating mostly insects such as termites, wasps, ants, stinkbugs, cicadas, beetles, grasshoppers, crane flies, dragonflies, and caterpillars most of the year; small fruits make up the majority of their winter diets, though some who fall behind during migration have been seen eating seeds at feeders.

The best time to spot a Western Tanager on our refuge is in May, since the early migrants start showing up in April. A few of these migrants will stay to nest during the summer. In early fall, starting in August, they begin to migrate south again and are all gone by mid-September.

Good Things Come to Those Who Bait



Did You Know: Close to the turn of the twentieth century, many thought that Western Tanagers were a significant threat to commercial fruit crops. An observer wrote in 1896, "the damage done to cherries in one orchard was so great that the sales of the fruit which was left did not balance the bills paid out for poison and ammunition." Thankfully today it is illegal to shoot native birds, and Western Tanagers are safer than they were a century ago.

Bonus Fun Fact: A male Western Tanager was banded in Nevada in 1965 and lived 6 years and 11 months by the time he was recaptured and released during banding in Oregon in 1971.

If that pun wasn't enough for you, here's one that's a little more to the point of this month's Urban Refuge Support Team nugget: "A reel expert can tackle anything."

By now, you've probably caught on (there we go again) that we're talking about fishing. It's an activity that ranges from pastime to art form, depending on who you ask - but that's not exactly why we're talking about it here. What we really want to highlight are the growing relationships between our Urban Refuges and two outstanding organizations that firmly believe in nature's ability, specifically through fishing, to empower at-risk youth to envision a positive future.

<u>Soul River Inc.</u> has partnered with the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service for the past three years to put on <u>Celebration of Wild Steelhead</u>, a neighborhood park event that encourages young people from culturally diverse and income-challenged communities to try out fly fishing for the first time. The big picture for Soul River and its Founder, Chad Brown, is forming healing, mentoring relationships between military veterans with PTSD and inner city youth who experience trauma in their daily lives. The park event is a terrific first step in that process, offering youth a taste of fly fishing in a familiar, comfortable environment made all the more vibrant by live music, food, and partner activities.

Similarly, <u>I'm Hooked</u> uses fishing as a platform for positive youth development. The organization has hosted a two-day fishing event of the same name at Henry Hagg Lake near Gaston, OR **since 1989!** While the event is open to all, Director Wil Warren's primary motivation is offering nature as an alternative to negative influences many urban youth face. Over the years he has expanded his outreach from inner Portland to the suburbs of Washington County. Through a growing list of partners, I'm Hooked gets kids out on the lake in boats, entertains and educates them with other hands-on activities, and sends them home with a free rod and reel.

In addition to providing financial support, the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service has hosted activities at both events as a way of connecting budding anglers to the Service and other opportunities to experience nature close to home. The Celebration of Wild Steelhead was on September 11th, and I'm Hooked is a bit further out in June 2017. Fall Refuge Tips



The Friends of Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge want to share some reminders for a successful and fun visit to the refuge:

- 1. Until September 30th, you can walk along the River 'S' Unit Auto Tour Route.
- 2. BirdFest weekend, the fist weekend in October, is the last weekend to walk the Kiwa trail until May 2017.
- 3. Water: Make sure to bring water with you whether you are planning a long or a short visit, there is no access to drinking water on the refuge.
- 4. Restroom facilities: There are restrooms at the trailheads of both the Carty and River 'S' Units, and one stop right before the Kiwa Trail on the River 'S' Auto Tour Route, but there are no other facilities available to the public.
- 5. Trash Receptacles: There are no trash cans available so please pack out anything you bring in with you, we really appreciate it, and the wildlife does too!

And once again, don't forget to bring water! Thank you and we hope you have a great visit to Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge!
