



Sandhill Crane Antigone canadensis



As we all know, the Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge is a spectacular venue for birdwatching. In the fall, sandhill cranes are a treasured sight and sound at the Refuge.

Our amazing Urban Refuge is located in the Pacific Flyway, one of four bird migration pathways in the U.S. In the fall months, huge flocks of sandhill cranes coming from the north migrate through the Pacific Northwest on their way to the Central Valley of California, where they spend the winter. River 'S' Closures in October



The Refuge has received Emergency Funding to repair the landslide along the River 'S' entrance road that occurred last winter. The Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge River 'S' Unit (1071 S Hillhurst Rd.) will be closed:

Monday, October 2nd through Thursday October 5th, & Monday, October 9th through Wednesday, October 11th.

This will not impact BirdFest & Bluegrass events October 6th-8th.

The Carty Unit will remain open as always.

Fall Reminders!

- 1. The Kiwa Trail closes after BirdFest Weekend! Get out to the River 'S' Auto Tour Route, and make a stop at the Kiwa Trail while you still can!
- 2. The River 'S' Auto Tour Route goes back to cars only starting



October 1st! Your car is your blind, keep that in mind!

3. When you do visit, remember to bring water!

- 4. There are no trash receptacles on the refuge! Please pack out what you bring in.
- There are no picnic areas on the refuge, while we encourage you to stay hydrated and filled with protein while you walk, please do not leave the trails or leave trash behind.

6. While the berries look ripe and inviting, please do not pick, eat, or remove anything from the refuge! Wildlife depend on these food sources, many berries aren't meant for humans, and some plants are treated with



herbicides to keep them off trails.

As always, no dogs are allowed on the refuge, as well as bikes, fire, running or bird-song playback.

Beginner Watercolor Workshop

In this workshop, participants will be guided step-by step through basic watercolor techniques: how to apply a wash, how to apply details with light and shadow, and the effect of distance on colors as they paint a landscape scene to take home. Pacific Northwest Ethnobotany Hike

Saturday 12:30 to 2:00 pm.

Join one of our Refuge Naturalists for an in-depth exploration of the native flora of the Refuge. Since Time Immemorial the lives of local indigenous peoples, wildlife, and oaks have been deeply interconnected. This hike highlights several of the major points on the Oaks to Wetlands Trail, including a massive ancestral oak, a cedar grove, Boot Lake, and the oak balds. Hikers should come prepared for an extended hike on moderately uneven terrain. Meet at the tent across the sidewalk from the Plankhouse.

Chinook Culture Talk

Saturday 1:00 to 3:00 pm.

Plankhouse. Please join us for a special presentation by Dr. Jon Daehnke (University of California Santa Cruz) and Rachel Cushman (Chinook Indian Nation Tribal Council Member) for a talk exploring the politics of cultural heritage and public representations of the past, especially within the context of Native American identity and the legacies of colonialism. The discussion will focus on a collaborative book project between Daehnke and the Chinook Indian Nation that explores the challenges and successes of their efforts to reaffirm control of their own heritage.

A Stroll Through the Oaks

Saturday 2:30 to 3:30 pm.

Family Friendly. Join one of our Refuge Naturalists for a leisurely stroll on the Oaks to Wetlands Trail. Learn how people, place, plants, and animals are interconnected at the Refuge. Cathlapotle Village Hike

Cathlapotle is the Chinookan village that stood for hundreds of years on what is today Refuge property. Participants should come prepared for the weather and a three mile hike on uneven terrain. Meet at the tent across the sidewalk from the Plankhouse.

Habitat Restoration Updates & Events

Falling into Fall

With the passing of the autumnal equinox, it is clear that change is afoot on the Refuge. To watch the geese fly in formations with cacophonous pronouncements of their return is as if the pages of A Sand County Almanac have come alive. And with that, our work in habitat restoration has changed. Gone are the hot summer days with hori in hand, side-stepping chorus frogs in a sea of dragonflies. That wonderful full view of Mt. Saint Helens will disappear behind a veil of persistent cloud for the next 9 months.

Each Wednesday for Fall, Winter, and Spring we'll be lopping blackberry, maintaining previous years' plantings, pulling barbed wire or fence posts, planting trees, or a mishmash of that and more, all while being chilly and rained



upon. Sound like fun? You bet it is! What's more, we'll also be out among the geese and the swans on the last Saturdays of every month.
