Annual Member Meeting & Brunch

Saturday, January 26th, 2019



2019 may have started off slow with the government shutdown, but the members, volunteers, and supporters of the Friends of Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge made time on Saturday, January 26th to meet, enjoy brunch, reflect on 2018, and talk about the year ahead. Ilani Casino provided an excellent location for our brunch meeting, with a delicious array of food and a lovely atmosphere.

Gathered in the Salish Room at Ilani, Friends enjoyed a slideshow featuring photo contest winners and photos of our Refuge, volunteers, and special events while they ate. The meeting portion of the day included the opportunity for a

membership vote to approve new board members Anna Wilde and Nick Legg, approve the addition of Kara Caselas and Drew Smith-Sanhow to the board from earlier in the year, and to renew of the terms of Susan Setterberg and Sam Robinson.

After a short program, attendees were treated to a special presentation of the First Annual Spirit of

the Wild Award. The inaugural award was given to the City of Ridgefield for their long term partnership and outstanding support of the Friends and the Refuge over the years. The projects, programming, and events that the City has supported make up a very long list. A few examples include, the City providing ongoing counseling and support in the structural development of our organization, serving as a conduit between our smaller community of organizations and City-based organizations (First Saturdays, Chamber of Commerce, Arts Association, Main Street), always inviting and welcoming the Friends into their events, and serving as an outstanding partner in our BirdFest and Bluegrass festival (particularly over the last



few years - largely taking over the in-town events and helping to create a wonderful festival for all ages and interests. Lee Knottnerus, the Deputy City Manager, and Sandra Day, City Council Member, attend every board meeting and are advisors to the organization. Lee also sits on the BirdFest committee and the Community Nature Center committee, and Sandra has adopted part of the I-5 highway near the Ridgefield exit in the name of the Friends! As if to solidify it all, our founding Friends members, Sydney Reisbick, Allene Wodage, Jim Maul, Amy Montoya, and David Dines are recognized at Overlook Park in the Wings of the World statue by Sharon Agnor. The City's support of the Friends and the Refuge is unparalleled, and we are very grateful for their partnership.

June 30, 1945 ~ January 3, 2019

The Board and Staff of the Friends of the Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge regret to inform you all that past Board Member Gerald (Gerry) Williams passed away on January 3rd of this year.



Wildlife Refuge in the summer of 2013. Gerry didn't volunteer his time lightly, as he noted in the letter of interest he submitted when he applied, having only been on one other board before choosing to join us. He loved taking photos at the Refuge and attending the many

presentations and events that we held, both before and after his time on the board.

Many of us think fondly of Gerry as we process the news. He was a major part in the hiring committee for many Friends employees, he helped with events like BirdFest & Bluegrass by tabling our information booth, and he always had a new incredible photo to share with us at board meetings and when we ran into him on the Refuge.

Gerry was a quiet man when it came to our work, but that didn't hide his vast knowledge of our Refuge and the history of our area. With a background as the National/Chief Historian and the Regional Sociologist for the Forest Service in the Portland area, and Research Director for Eugene Parks and Recreation (to name just a few of the many titles he held), he spent much of his life focused on the history, assessment, and implementation of public land management.

The board would like to express our deepest sorrow for Gerry's departure and convey our condolence to his family. The board would also like to express our sincere appreciation for Gerry's tremendous and valuable contribution to the Friends over the years. Gerry will be long remembered by his fellow directors, the staff, and volunteers of the Refuge.
