BirdFest & Bluegrass

Saturday, October 1st, 2022

The 2022 BirdFest & Bluegrass will be entirely in person! The City of Ridgefield will be hosting in-person in-town events, including vendors and music in Downtown Ridgefield, plus we will have a self-guided Carty Unit Refuge hike, wandering trail stewards to answer questions, Sandhill Crane Tours, tours of the new Refuge office building, and a bus tour of the River 'S' Unit!

The Refuge will be fee-free, and seasonal trails will be open for an extra weekend!

Montana Comes to Ridgefield. Join local geologist Jim Maul for an interpretive walk around the Carty Unit. Jim will share with you the story of the landscape of the Refuge and Ridgefield area and its connection to the Missoula Floods that inundated our area at the end of the last ice age. Meet at the Oaks-to-Wetlands Trailhead by the fee station.

Carty Lake Trail entrance at the Port of Ridgefield: The Carty Lake Trail entrance at the Port of Ridgefield is open! This new trail system offers Port visitors a fee-based, seasonal walking trail with views of wildlife on Carty Lake, and takes the public to the Cathlapotle Plankhouse, the Oaks to Wetlands Trail System, and the Refuge Office. The Port entrance to the Carty Lake Trail has a small, fee-free out-and-back section that leads to an overlook of Lake River.

Kiwa Trail: After being closed much of the summer, the Kiwa Trail will be open an extra day in celebration of BirdFest & Bluegrass! About halfway through the Auto Tour Route, find a small parking lot where you can park and access this flat walking trail. It is a 1.3 mile loop, over half of which has little to no shade, so keep that in mind and bring water and sunscreen. Mosquitos may also be an issue.

The Carty Unit Oaks-to-Wetlands Trail, within the Oak Restoration area, is generally closed Thursdays for trail maintenance, watch for signs.

NOTE: The Washington State Discover Pass is not valid on Federally managed public lands, including National Wildlife Refuges. Find out more about <u>fees & passes here.</u>

Species Spotlight

BirdFest & Bluegrass 2022 Bird of the Year Killdeer



The first question everyone asks is, where does the name "Killdeer" come from? These members of the plover family have a pretty unmistakable call, loud enough to hear at long distances, that sounds like an excited utterance of the word, "killdeer!" Eighteenth-century naturalists also noticed how noisy Killdeer are, giving them names such as the Chattering Plover and the Noisy Plover. You can often hear this sound even after the sun sets, or when they take flight.

In the breeding season, males fly high over nesting territory in a floating, wavering flight, with slow, deep wingbeats, while giving that signature 'kill-deer' call repeatedly. On the ground, their courtship displays include ritualized nest-scrape making. The nest ends up a shallow scrape in soil or gravel, either unlined or lined with pebbles, grass, twigs, bits of debris.


Of course, even more well known than their call is their broken-wing act to lead predators away from their vulnerable nests. Like other members of the plover family, this species is often found at the water's edge, but it also lives in pastures and fields far from water, gravel is a particular favorite because of how well it helps blend in with their eggs. Many have been fooled by the 'broken-wing' act, where the Killdeer flutters along the ground with one wing extended in a show of injury...Keep reading at the bottom of our BirdFest & Bluegrass page!


Board Seeking New MembersOr, Join a Committee


